

MESSAGE FROM SHIRE PRESIDENT

Well, September has been an eventful month.

On September 8th Freeman of the Shire, Mr Bill Seimons, celebrated his 100th birthday. For the most part, this was a family affair with Mr Seimons not wishing a fuss to be made.

But we could hardly ignore such a momentous occasion, could we?

So, we asked the family if we could tack a small salute onto their celebrations. Over some months staff and Councillors had been discussing what we could do to acknowledge the 100th birthday of someone who has been so instrumental to the development of the place we call home. We finally decided that we would refurbish the garden in Station Square and dedicate it to Mr Seimons and the massive contribution he has made to Corrigin.

In brief, Mr Seimons has dedicated his life to our community. He was a Shire Councillor from 1952 – 1985, Deputy President 1963 – 1975 and President 1975 – 1978. While 33 years on Council is a huge achievement, this was by no

means his only contribution. He was the inaugural President of the Corrigin Senior Citizens' Committee which drove and oversaw the construction of the Seniors Citizens' Hall and the first four independent living units. He remained an important member of that committee for 45 years, taking a huge role in the continued development of a further 8 units. Mr Seimons resigned from that Committee in 2016 at the age of 97.

In his home town of Bullaring, Mr Seimons was the much respected elder statesman. His general store, GW Seimons and Son, was the hub of our small settlement and Mr Seimons was the "Lord Mayor". He was the Secretary of the Bullaring Progress Association for over 50 years and was a committee member of every Bullaring organisation – including tennis club, cricket club, golf club etc.

Not only was he a leader of our community, he was also a compassionate and considerate businessman, offering generous payment terms for locals when the seasons went against them.

We are eternally grateful for Mr Seimons' contribution and celebrate his 100th birthday, with great love and respect.

Unfortunately, September also saw us lose another of our Honorary Freeman of the Shire with the death of David Abe on September 7th. Mr David Abe was presented with his award in 2011, after being nominated in 2010.

David was a Shire Councillor for 28 years from 1975 which included 6 years as President. His focus on the town of Corrigin saw him being part of the Rural Towns Programme which identified and mapped the town's ground water system. This led to the installation of many bores which pumped water away from the town and into dams, saving many town properties from flooding and encroaching salinity.

David was the inaugural Chair of the Corrigin Sporting Council which oversaw the development of Corrigin's sporting facilities, including the Cyril Box Pavilion, as well as new netball courts and hockey field.

Apart from his local commitments he also took on regional roles, including the Inaugural Chair of Regional Road Group Wheatbelt South, which distributes road funding to 18 Local Governments.

As a Vietnam vet, David organised Corrigin's ANZAC Day Dawn Service for many years.

He was also a member of many local sporting clubs and played tennis at a high level. He became a Life Member of the Corrigin Tennis Club in 1996 having been a member for 45 years, a committee member for 18 years, captain and vice-captain numerous times as well as stints as President and Vice-President.

Our Community is the poorer for David's loss and I offer our condolences to his family.

On a brighter note, our Agricultural Society put on a fantastic Show once again. There was plenty to see and do and, although I'm not sure of the numbers, it looked like there was quite a good crowd there.

Again, I thank all of those wonderful people who contribute such a lot of their time and effort to keep this Show going. It really is a credit to all of you, whose only reward is its continued success. Congratulations to President Tim Thornton, secretary Sue Courboules and your team for another great day.

Nominations for 3 Councillor positions closed on September 12^{th} with two of those positions remaining unfilled. Congratulations to Mike Weguelin on your election, unopposed.

It is really disappointing that we have been unable to fill those positions. However, we will have an extraordinary election in December and will undoubtedly have some great people nominate to serve their community.

This will be my last "President's Notes" (my 95th) as I have not re-nominated to Council. I have enjoyed my time on Council immensely, particularly my fellow Councillors and the many staff members that I have worked with. I don't believe that the general public realise just how much Shire staff do, or how many hoops they have to jump through to complete their tasks. As with any workplace, the culture of the organisation is largely dependent on the CEO, and I think we've had 4 great ones in my time.

I have been honoured to have represented you, the residents, the heart and soul of the Shire of Corrigin, over the years. My very grateful thanks to all of those people who it has been my pleasure to work with, especially those who have supported me during my term as President.

Freeman of the Shire

In memory of Honorary Freeman of the Shire, David Abé and his incredible contribution to the Shire of Corrigin and Corrigin community.

David was born in Corrigin in 1945 and was an active community member, living in Corrigin for all of his life working as a farmer in Bilbarin. The Abé family are original pioneers of the district settling 1915.

David rendered outstanding service to the district of the Shire of Corrigin including over 28 years as an elected member of the Shire of Corrigin, during which time he served as Deputy President for 3 years and President for 6 years. During his lifetime in the Shire of Corrigin, David endeared himself to the community by the manner in which he contributed to the public welfare, through his patronage and membership of various community organizations and by his enthusiasm and sincerity through which he attained the respect and admiration of the people of the district.

David's contributions as an elected member of the Shire of Corrigin including his contribution as Shire President, are a matter for the public record. Many of the projects which he was involved in are still providing a benefit to the community many years later. The effectiveness and longevity of the public and community works projects which were directed by him are a testament to his vision and foresight as a community leader. In the community and sporting arena David was a talented sportsman who has contributed to the community not only through is physical endeavours but also as a club administrator.

David has contributed to the fabric of Corrigin through a lifetime of community service and selfless endeavour

Here are just some of David's outstanding, significant and meritorious contributions;

- David returned to Corrigin after his military service to contribute a lifetime of community service as a civic leader to his home town.
- Called up and fought during the Vietnam War and was awarded several medals for his service to Australia.
- Sole organiser of the Corrigin ANZAC Day Dawn Service for many years, over 150 people regularly attend this service.
- Elected to the Shire of Corrigin in 1975 on the Kurrenkutten Ward and served on Council for 28 years during which time he served as Deputy President for 3 years (1992-1995) and President for 6 years (1995-2001) retiring in 2003.
- Inaugural Chairman of the Wheatbelt South Regional Road Group.
- Member of the Rural Towns Program (1997-2003).
- Oversaw the mapping of the town and adjacent area to identify the underground water system. As Corrigin had a rising water table problem and in turn, townsite salinity that was affecting buildings in the town. As part of State Rural Towns several bores were drilled and fresh water could then be used to water the town ovals and gardens with salt water pumped down to the lakes system. This was very successful in saving many buildings.
- Delegate to Narembeen Drainage Council.
- Inaugural Chairman of the Sporting Council which planned, fundraised and constructed Cyril Box Pavilion. This happened
 during a drought which made fundraising much harder. David was involved with cropping, fundraising events and door knocking
 to raise the required funds. Cyril Box was completed in 1979 along with the laying of Basketball/Netball Courts and grassed
 hockey field.
- Further to this in 2000, Council upgraded the oval lighting and reticulation system at the sporting precinct.
- Involved in the development of Courboules Crescent in 1978/1979.
- Involved in land subdivisions of Channon Close and Spanney Street.
- Oversaw the continual upgrades of Council staff houses and provision of community housing. This involved 3 new staff houses as well as a new Doctor's house, 3 new Government Employees Health Association (GEHA) houses and another 2 single persons units.
- Completion of 6 Senior Citizens units in 1978/79.
- Involved in the construction of the Wogerlin House, which was completed using community, Government and Lotteries funding.
- Involved in the construction of 3 single persons units in Jose Street in 1990/1991
- Swimming Pool upgrade completed in 1998.
- Involved in the saleyards overhaul in 1991/1992 to change the saleyards from timber to steel.
- Involved in the refurbishment of Shire Office.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT EXTRAORDINARY ELECTIONS 14 DECEMBER 2019

Nominations are called for the Shire of Corrigin Extraordinary Elections to be held on Saturday 14 December 2019, to fill the following vacancy on the Council of the Shire of Corrigin:

District Two (2) Vacancies Four (4) Year Terms

Nominations for these vacancies open on Thursday 31 October 2019 and close at 4.00pm on Thursday 7 November 2019.

To be eligible to nominate as a candidate you must be an elector of the district (residential or owner/ occupier) and over 18 years of age. This year it is compulsory for all candidates to complete an online induction prepared by the Department of Local Government available on the website www.dlgsc.wa.gov.au/local-government/local-governments/council-elections/local-government-candidate-induction. You will need to declare that you have completed the online induction when you complete your nomination form. It is an offence to make false or misleading statements on the nomination form.

To nominate as a candidate in the local government election you will need to:

- Complete the online Induction
- Complete and submit a nomination form;
- Supply a candidate profile (150 words maximum);
- Pay a deposit of \$80; and
- Include a recent passport size photograph (optional).

All nomination applications must be signed by the candidate in front of a witness and presented to Natalie Manton, Returning Officer before 4.00pm on the 7 **November 2019. If is recommended that you don't leave it until the last minute in** case any changes are required prior to the close of nominations.

Stevenson Scholarship for Further Education APPLICATIONS NOW OPEN

The Stevenson Scholarship was established by the late Edna Stevenson (a former resident of the Shire of Corrigin) to promote and advance the education of the residents of the Shire of Corrigin. Stevenson Scholarships are administered by the Trustees of the Edna Stevenson Trust.

Eligibility

Stevenson Scholarships are available to students who are residents of the Shire of Corrigin and/or whose parents or guardians are not able to provide sufficient financial assistance for the student to achieve a tertiary education.

Resident Status

Residents are defined as:

- (a) A person residing in the Shire of Corrigin at the time of applying for the Stevenson Scholarship.
- (b) A former resident of the Shire of Corrigin (of not more than two years absence) who was a student at a school in the Shire of Corrigin for at least three years whose immediate family resides in Corrigin.

Student Status

Students must be enrolled in and attending any of the following:

- (a) Corrigin District High School
- (b) Any government run senior high school in Western Australia
- (c) An agricultural high school or college in Western Australia
- (d) A TAFE college in Western Australia
- (e) A university in Western Australia

Scholarships

Scholarships provide financial assistance to help cover the costs of text books, enrolment fees and course fees at approved educational institutions. The following amounts are indicative

only, lesser or greater amounts may be awarded depending on the course of study and financial need:

- SECONDARY STUDY up to \$2,000
- TERTIARY STUDY up to \$5,000 Scholarships are awarded for one year periods. Scholarship recipients may apply for further scholarships on a year by year basis.


